60 Credits

The Associate of Arts (AA) degree provides the equivalent of the first two years of a Bachelor of Arts degree. Students who pursue this degree are generally intending to transfer to UNLV, UNR or another baccalaureate level institution. Immediate employment upon completion of the AA may be a secondary objective.

The following courses may be used to meet the distribution requirements noted on degree sheets. Specific degrees may have additional restrictions. No one course may be used to meet two or more of the distribution requirements. Only courses numbered 100 or above may be used to meet these requirements. Students should make sure that the courses they select will also meet the requirements of the institution to which they intend to transfer.

MULTICULTURAL REQUIREMENT: All students must meet a CCSN Multicultural Requirement. The purpose of this requirement is to ensure that all students take a course or courses whose primary purpose is to examine the diversity and differences within and between ethnic and racial, sexual, religious, gender, or disabilities cultures within the United States. The College Curriculum Committee will be responsible for the certification of courses fulfilling this requirement. With the exception of the International Requirement, courses used to meet the Multicultural Requirement may also be used simultaneously to meet major requirements or one other core requirement in Fine Arts, Humanities, or Social Sciences.

Courses meeting the Multicultural Core Requirement:

ANTH 205, ANTH 209, CRJ 120, ENG 267, EDUC 280, HIST 107, HIST 260, MUS 126, MUS 130, PHIL 147, PT 122, SPH 133, SOC 205, WS 101

INTERNATIONAL REQUIREMENT: All students must meet a CCSN International Requirement. The purpose of this requirement is to ensure that all students take a course or courses, including foreign language courses whose primary purpose is to examine peoples and cultures outside of the United States. The College Curriculum Committee will be responsible for the certification of courses fulfilling this requirement. A student may not use a single course to meet both the Multicultural Requirement and the International Requirement, although a course could be certified to meet either one. With the exception of the Multicultural Requirement courses used to meet the International Requirement may also be used simultaneously to meet major requirements or one other core requirement in Fine Arts, Humanities, or Social Sciences.

Courses meeting the International Core Requirement:

ANTH 112, ANTH 201, ART 202, Foreign Languages 113/114 & 221/222 HIST 150, HIST 151, MUS 121, PSC 231, PHIL 119

Students may elect to graduate using the degree requirements in effect at the time of matriculation or completion. If a program is official after a student has matriculated, the student may choose the degree requirements of the new program.

In no case may a student use a catalog which is more than six years old at the time of graduation. (For example, a May, 1996 graduate could not use degree requirements from a 1989-91 catalog.)
