



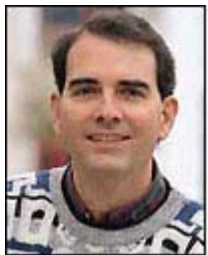
Michael Strong
Legal Writing Professor

Professor Strong is a 1994 graduate of the University of Chicago Law School, where he served as comment editor of the University of Chicago Law School Roundtable, a journal of interdisciplinary studies. Immediately following law school, he served first as Staff Attorney for the United States Sentencing Commission and then as a judicial clerk for the Fourth District Court of Appeals in West Palm Beach, Florida. For four years, Professor Strong was Attorney/Legal Writing Specialist with the Office of the Federal Public Defender in Charleston, West Virginia. Most recently, he was an associate of the law firm of Ward & Frieson in Atlanta, Georgia. Professor Strong teaches Lawyering Process.



Raquel Aldana-Pindell
Assistant Professor of Law

Professor Aldana-Pindell earned her J.D. degree in 1997 from Harvard University, where she served as articles editor to the Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review. Prior to coming to the Boyd School of Law, Professor Aldana-Pindell worked for the Center for Justice and International Law representing victims of gross human rights violations in the Inter-American System on Human Rights. She also taught a seminar in human rights at the University of Baltimore School of Law. Prior to that, she was an associate at the law firm of Jones, Day, Reavis & Pogue in Washington, D.C. Professor Aldana-Pindell teaches Immigration Law, Criminal Procedure, and International Human Rights.



Jay Bybee
Professor of Law

Professor Bybee earned his J.D. cum laude in 1980 from J. Reuben Clark Law School, Brigham Young University. At Brigham Young University he was the Business Manager for the Brigham Young University Law Review. Following graduation he served as a clerk to the Honorable Donald Russell of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit. In 1981, he became an associate with the Washington, D.C. firm of Sidley & Austin. From 1984 to 1989, he was an attorney at the U.S. Department of Justice Office of Legal Policy and Civil Division, Appellate Staff. He served in the White House as Associate Counsel to the President from 1989 until 1991 when he joined the Louisiana State University Law Center and taught in the areas of constitutional and administrative law. He has published articles in various journals, including the Yale Law Journal, Northwestern University Law Review, Vanderbilt Law Review, and George Washington Law Review. Professor Bybee teaches Civil Procedure/Alternative Dispute Resolution,

Constitutional Law, and Administrative Law. Professor Bybee will be on leave for the Spring 2002 semester.



Bruce Markell

Professor Markell is a 1977 graduate of Pitzer College, and a 1980 graduate of the King Hall School of Law, University of California at Davis, where he was first in his class and editor-in-chief of the law review. Following graduation, he clerked for then-judge Anthony M. Kennedy when Justice Kennedy was a member of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. He practiced in Los Angeles for 10 years, leaving a partnership with Sidley & Austin to join the law faculty at Indiana University School of Law - Bloomington. Before joining the faculty at the Boyd School of Law in 1999, he was the Bruce W. Nichols Visiting Professor of Law at Harvard Law School and the Southeastern Bankruptcy Law Institute Visiting Professor of Law at Georgia State University. Professor Markell is the author of numerous articles on bankruptcy and commercial law, including several chapters in the revised 15th edition of Collier on Bankruptcy. He is a member of the board of editors for Collier on Bankruptcy, also a revision editor for Collier's Bankruptcy Manual. He is currently working on three casebooks in the areas of Contracts, Bankruptcy and Securitization. He is a member of the American Law Institute, a fellow of the American College of Bankruptcy, a conferee of the National Bankruptcy Conference and a member of the International Insolvency Institute. He is a member of the American Bankruptcy Law Journal's Editorial Advisory Board, and is a consultant to the Advisory Committee to the Federal Rules of Bankruptcy Procedure. He has also recently served as an adviser to the Republic of Indonesia on the reform of its bankruptcy, secured transactions and securitization laws. Professor Markell teaches Contracts, Commercial Law, and Bankruptcy.



Robert Correales

Assistant Professor of Law

Professor Correales earned his J.D. in 1991 from the University of Kansas School of Law and an LL.M. from the Georgetown University Law Center in 1993, where he served a two-year teaching fellowship. As a fellow at Georgetown's Institute for Public Representation, Professor Correales participated in clinical teaching of law students in the fields of disability law, communications law, and environmental law. From 1993 to 1998, he served as Assistant Dean at the University of Wisconsin Law School and taught a seminar on Law and People with Disabilities and an undergraduate course in the Behavioral Science and Law Program. Professor Correales teaches Torts, Employment Law, and Labor Law.



Carl Tobias
Professor of Law

Professor Tobias earned his LL.B. degree at the University of Virginia. From 1975 until 1998, he was a professor at the University of Montana School of Law, where he taught administrative law, constitutional law, environmental law, federal courts, land use planning, products liability, and torts. He has visited on the faculty of several law schools, including Georgetown, North Carolina, Pittsburgh, Rutgers-Camden, Seton Hall, and Temple. Professor Tobias has written extensively in the areas of federal civil procedure and federal courts, publishing articles in numerous journals, including California Law Review, Cornell Law Review, Stanford Law Review, Columbia Law Review, and Harvard Journal on Legislation. He is currently a member of the American Law Institute and the study committee to review the Nevada Rules of Civil Procedure. He has served on the District Court Local Rules Review Committee, Ninth Circuit Judicial Council and the Civil Justice Reform Act Advisory Group, United States District Court for the District of Montana. Professor Tobias teaches Constitutional Law, Torts, Products Liability, and advises the Nevada Law Journal.



Christopher Bryant
Assistant Professor of Law

Professor Bryant earned his J.D. with high honors in 1994 from the University of Chicago Law School, where he was a topic access editor of the University of Chicago Law Review. He subsequently served as a law clerk to Judge James L. Buckley of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit and later became an associate at the law firm of Shea & Gardner in Washington, D.C. Immediately prior to joining the Boyd School of Law faculty, he held the position of Assistant Senate Legal Counsel in the Office of Senate Legal Counsel. Professor Bryant teaches Criminal Law, Conflict of Laws, Legislation, and Federal Courts.



Jeffrey Stempel
Professor of Law

Professor Stempel is a 1981 graduate of Yale Law School, where he was an editor of the Yale Law Journal and co-founder of the Yale Law and Policy Review. He spent two years as a law clerk to a federal district court judge in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and three years in private practice with a firm in Minneapolis, Minnesota before entering the teaching profession. Professor Stempel served on the faculty at Brooklyn Law School and the Florida State University College of Law, where he held the title of Fonvielle & Hinkle Professor of Litigation. Professor Stempel has numerous publications to his credit,

including books, treatise chapters and supplements, and law review articles. Professor Stempel teaches Evidence, Professional Responsibility, and Insurance Law.



Thomas McAfee
Professor of Law

Professor McAfee earned his J.D. in 1979 from the University of Utah College of Law, where he served as articles editor of the Utah Law Review. Professor McAfee served as law clerk to the Honorable J. Clifford Wallace, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. He practiced in the labor department of Gray, Cary, Ames and Frye in San Diego, California. From 1982 to 1998, he taught at Southern Illinois University School of Law in the areas of constitutional law, American legal history, statutory interpretation, first amendment rights, administrative law, criminal procedure, jurisprudence, legal argumentation, and legal writing and reasoning. He has published numerous articles in law journals including the Harvard Journal of Law and Public Policy, Columbia Law Review, Brigham Young University Law Review, and Temple Law Review, and was awarded the Faculty Achievement Award for Scholarship in 1997. His book, Inherent Rights, the Written Constitution, and Popular Sovereignty: The Founders' Understanding, was published in 2000. Professor McAfee advises the Nevada Law Journal and teaches American Legal History, First Amendment Rights, and Constitutional Law.



Terrill Pollman
Assistant Professor of Law and Director of Legal Research and Writing

Professor Pollman received her B.A. in art history from the University of Arizona in 1972 and her J.D. magna cum laude in 1990 from the University of Arizona College of Law, where she was an articles editor for the Arizona Law Review. She began teaching legal writing in 1991 at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. From 1993 to 1996, she was the Director of Legal Writing at Stetson University College of Law. Professor Pollman later returned to the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign as Director of Legal Writing. She has taught courses in Advanced Legal Writing, Advocacy, Feminist Jurisprudence, and U.S. Law. Professor Pollman directs the Lawyering Process Program and teaches Lawyering Process and Property.



Richard Brown
Professor of Law

Professor Brown earned his J.D. magna cum laude from Indiana University in 1975, where he served as an associate editor of the Indiana Law Journal, and earned his M.L.L.

in 1978 from the University of Washington. He came to the William S. Boyd School of Law as Director of the Law Library and Professor of Law after serving for fifteen years as Director of the Law Library and Professor of Law at Arizona State University College of Law where he oversaw the planning and construction of an architectural award winning law library. Prior to joining the faculty at Arizona State University, he was Assistant Law Librarian and Assistant Professor of Law at Florida State University College of Law. Professor Brown teaches Property and Wills, Trusts and Estates.



Jean Whitney

Legal Writing Professor and Associate Director of Legal Research and Writing

Professor Whitney is a 1988 magna cum laude graduate of the William Mitchell College of Law. After earning her J.D. degree, she served as a clerk to Chief Justices Douglas K. Amdahl and Peter S. Popovich of the Minnesota Supreme Court and also as an assistant attorney general for the Minnesota Attorney General's Office. From 1990 to 1999, Professor Whitney held the position of Director of Policy and Legal Services for the Minnesota Department of Corrections and taught as an adjunct professor at the William Mitchell College of Law. Professor Whitney teaches Lawyering Process and Juvenile Law.
